



WCMX WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS ORGANISERS GUIDE

Hosting the WCMX World Championships is a great opportunity to organise a great show by welcoming the best riders in the discipline and grow a country WCMX community.

However, it also comes with responsibilities, as the reputation of the sport depends on these important events. Moreover, athletes from all over the world will make the effort to come to your event at their own expenses. Therefore the following requirements have to be fulfilled:

1. Candidate countries must **apply to the World WCMX Federation** with a full description of their project by the 31th of August, the year prior to the year they want to host the WCMX World Championships, including:
 - The chosen date(s) for the event and a provisional schedule;
 - The location where the event will take place and plans/photos from the venue (skatepark);
 - A solution for athletes transportation (closer airport and transportation possibilities from the airport to the location of the event);
 - Possibilities for accessible lodging, such as nearby hotels.
 - The expected number of nations and solution to improve this number if necessary. A World Championships should aim to have riders from a minimum of four (4) nations.

Any additional information, such as grants to help athletes travelling, free lodging, prize money, livestream or any element in favour of the project are a bonus.

Note: Candidates should not announce anything before receiving a confirmation from World WCMX, as other countries might also be candid and the best project will be selected.

2. During the event, any competition leading to a World WCMX title must **follow the World WCMX Rulebook**, including the following elements:
 - A venue (skatepark) with features rideable in a wheelchair (use of extra ramps, kickers or rails is welcome) and adapted to the level of the World Championships;
 - A competition format of 2x 90 seconds runs (best count) or, 2x 90 seconds runs (best count) and 3 best tricks (best count for 50%)
 - Minimum 3 judges; 3 judges and 1 head judge is preferred.
 - Minimal practice time of 4 hours (between 8am and 9pm) the three (3) days before the event, and of 2 hours (after 8am) the day of the event
3. The event must at the minimum include **a Pro Women and a Pro men** divisions. A Youth division is recommended.
4. During the event, all athletes must follow the World WCMX Rulebook and Pro Women and Pro Men athletes (at the minimum) must have **completed the classification process**.
5. **Judges must be trained** in the scoring process and the classification system. A written document is available.
6. In order to notify riders, organisers must communicate to World WCMX, at the latest 2 weeks (14days) prior to the beginning of the event:
 - Final schedule, including: practice times - the days leading to the event and on the event day(s), rider meeting time - on the day(s) of the event and competition time - on the day(s) of the event;
 - chosen competition format for each division;
 - chosen marking for movable modules if applicable (see World WCMX rulebook 7.7).
7. Organisers must communicate of the results to World WCMX (including scores) on the day(s) of the event.
